Notes from the Building Team

Signed, Sealed and Hand-Delivered...

all the documents/drawings requested by the Town Planning Department were re-filed at Planning, on Monday, Aug. 24, 2018. (Planning Department Application was originally submitted in November 2017.)

Our architect, Peter Marren, and builder, Eugene Burger, are working together on the updated, comprehensive cost estimates. The Building Team (BT) and Board will review the new estimated costs when we get them (in a week or two). Our architect and BT will work within the building budget and cost estimates to determine the final scope of the work of building the church. There will be a series of meetings and discussions: our architect, builder, BT, and various sub-contractors/vendors will meet to resolve these issues. All of it will be reviewed by the church Board.

We will keep you posted when our Variance Meeting is (to be) scheduled, this fall. We need a variance to place the new church the same distance from the curb/street as the old church (...and a few other things). We expect to be approved. But we have to go through the Variance Meeting process, first.

Our building design was presented (and favorably received) at the Southold Historic Preservation Commission.

We are moving forward...!

Thoughts on Spirit

“There Are Two Sides to Every Story”

...and “There’s more than one way to skin a cat” are aphorisms that suggest we STOP and consider the validity of an idea, proposition, or recommendation, and any alternatives, before we accept and act on it. Getting a second opinion is most always a good thing, especially when it comes from our own decision to look at something from another angle. Each of us needs to go in search of his/her own truth, and to use our conclusion to do what is right, as we each see it.

I believe that this advice applies to just about everything, from personal decisions to adopting a position on issues beyond our control. Gather facts, others’ thoughts, then run it all through the best sifter there is, your own mind and feelings. The end product is your very best!

Keep your mind open, and be willing to change it. Review the important stuff in this manner, frequently. Our culture often argues that we shouldn’t second guess ourselves... in the interest of getting on with it. That idea is frequently floated by someone who wants us to jump on *their* bandwagon. Bandwagons offer comfortable rides ... we all sing the same tune, and merrily roll along without having to think for ourselves.

I think it’s vital to lend our time and energy to group efforts whose goals we support... but it’s still important to do it in a way that reflects our own refined thinking.

I was once asked to join a small anti-war rally at the main intersection in Key West to protest the bombing decisions of Bush/Cheney/Rumsfeld. It was to be a silent affair on a Sunday afternoon... no shouting...letting our individually made sign or banner speak for itself. I was in total agreement with the effort, but not comfortable with the violent sounding messages I read. So I made my own sign to say simply, “Love thy neighbor as thyself...” A motorcycle guy passing through stopped and approached the group hurling abusive insults at us one-by-one. When he came to my sign, he was clearly taken aback... his face softened and his body language lost its angry edge, although he said nothing.

I like to think that my decision to protest my way... in favor of an idea I believed to be at the heart of the matter, rather than “Bush bashing” ... had some effect on that man. I’ll never know... but I spoke my truth, after deciding there might be more than one way to skin a cat!
