In addition, I am beginning a new series of classes on the 7 Principles, exploring their past and present. There will be discussion and video and reading, so please be sure to register when I send out the email. The class will be held on Thursday night, but there is no commitment to attend all of them.

Spiritual practice classes in the evenings will move to Thursdays.

I am also excited for the opportunities the Membership and Outreach team are developing. The recent sock and food drives have been a tremendous success, and soon you will hear about other exciting virtual get togethers!

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Thoughts on Spirit

"Consideration"

"He longs to alert others to the riches that lie buried within him, unsuspected by patrons who barely look up when he takes their orders."

I love this quote from Zadie Smith's 2000 novel, *White Teeth*. It refers to the feelings of Samad, an immigrant Bangladeshi waiter in a London restaurant. He is aching with frustration; he wants to be perceived as the multi-dimensional person he really is.

For me, it gets to the heart of the lesson, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." I.e., **consider** Samad in his totality, and don't treat him just as the guy with the annoyingly difficult to understand accent who is taking my dinner order. Obviously, time doesn't permit me to learn all about Samad in this context. But I can look up, greet him warmly, and show him with my eyes and a few words that I appreciate that he "has a life."

We are all multi-dimensional; we play many roles... in our family, in the workplace, in our community. We are *all* interesting. We all have strengths and weaknesses. It has been said that we each contain the potential for all the good and evil in the world; that we are, after all, but microcosms of the Universe, made in its image and likeness.

I can do my little bit to bring out the dimensional aspects of people, to give them a chance to shine. I can, in essence, ask them, "Who are you?"

In order to show consideration, we must pay attention to others. Full consideration includes listening, the most underrated element of love. When others are speaking, we must notice if we are listening to understand them, or to respond with our own thoughts. Attentive listening to understand is a requirement of being considerate. We can "take others in" with our ears!

And what does this kind of consideration get us? As with most of the loving aspects of communications, it can be a two-way street. The person receiving consideration feels noticed, humanized, perhaps ennobled. The one showing consideration, even in the smallest of matters, will sense that they are building karma, that they have committed a spiritual act.
