### **Dear Beloved Community,**

I am considering this week things learned from being with my co-conspirators (or co-religionists, if you prefer) along with your delegates, Brian and Patte, at General Assembly. As we collectively decided on the Article II changes to our statement of principles, I was inspired to become reacquainted by the work of activists whose business is creating change. There is an influential area of thought, voiced by adrienne maree brown and others, about something called emergent strategy. If we want to make change, how do we do it in new and more deeply effective – and deeply joyful – ways? How can we work in ways that foster trust? How can we adapt better? What would happen if we were comfortable with experimentation? In short, what if, knowing that change is ever-present, we shaped our relationship with change itself?

This philosophy has inspired me to think about the ways your community will be changing in anticipation of a new era of welcoming people to a new building and therefore a new sense of community. Your spiritual work will be thinking about what change will mean — what you need to retain, and what you are willing to jettison as you begin to imagine what new things will happen in your ministry on the North Fork.

I will be continuing with our monthly practice of labyrinth walks at the Presbyterian Church. Look for an announcement about a three-part workshop called Wi\$dom Path, in which we will reflect on the role of money in our spiritual development and spiritual auto-biography.

And, let us welcome Jeri, our new Office Administrator, as she steps into her pivotal role here. Please feel free to call the office during our new hours, Tues/Wed/Thurs, 10am-2pm, and say hi and welcome her, if you have not met her already!

# News from the Social Action Committee & 8th Principle Task Force

A special thank you to the Worship Committee and everyone who contributed to the Potluck Picnic Brunch on 4th of July weekend. Despite there having been no sign-up sheets or flurry of emails about "who was bringing what," we managed to have plenty of yummy, healthy food with no duplications! In lieu of a formal worship service, we shared readings, poetry, music, lively conversation, and fellowship.

Our July First Sunday Share the Plate (STP) collection had been "postponed" until July 9th, but donations started coming in on July 2nd and the congregation's generosity amounted to a collection of \$ 205 which will be sent to the **Gold Boots Foundation**. More info on the Opioid Overdose Prevention program to come.

Much of our July SAC meeting was spent in discussion with Aiyoung Choi, the current Board President of **Women Cross DMZ (WCDMZ)**, **our August STP recipient.** WCDMZ is a global movement of women formed in 2014 to promote peace and bring an end to the Korean War, which was halted but not technically ended on July 27, 1953. WCDMZ gained international

recognition by organizing a historic 2015 crossing of the heavily armed De-Militarized Zone (DMZ) from North to South Korea. Thirty women from fifteen nations (including

Aiyoung), walked arm-in-arm with 10,000 Korean women on both sides of the DMZ. According to their website, <a href="http://www.womencrossdmz.org">http://www.womencrossdmz.org</a>, the work of WCDMZ isn't just about ending the Korean War, but threefold: a complete rethinking of the approach to peace and security; the reunification of separated families; and, the involvement of women at all levels of the peace building process.

July 27th of this year marks the 70th anniversary of the Korean War Armistice, but tensions continue to escalate on the Korean Peninsula. Advocates from across the USA convened in Washington, D.C., from July 26-28, 2023, to call on President Biden and Congress to support a formal peace agreement.

Aiyoung will be speaking to our congregation on Sunday, August 6th, about her experiences with WCDMZ, and their goals of a demilitarized Korea and a denuclearized world. SAC is planning an early fall viewing of the film, *Crossings*, which documents the journey of WCDMZ.

For the last two years, our **September and October STP** collections have been used to fulfill our yearly membership commitment to **NYUUJ**. However, Rev. Valerie informed me, as I was writing this article, that a UU congregation in Montpelier was surrounded by water during recent floods in Vermont – the extent of damage is yet unknown. And, you may have heard by now, that there was a firebomb attack late on Saturday night, July 23<sup>rd</sup>, at the UU Community Church of Plano, TX. Randy Wade had sent an article from *Daily Kos* but by now you can probably Google much more recent information. What we do know, as of this writing, is that a passerby called in the fire and that the fire alarms in the church alerted the Fire Department early enough that the fire was stopped before it could damage more than the front floors and the foyer. I have gotten support from SAC to change our requests of the Board this month to the following:

# -September STP recipient to be the UU Community Church of Plano, TX

**-October STP collection for NYUUJ.** Given the generosity of our congregation, we have been able to more than honor our annual pledge to NYUUJ in the last two years and I am confident that we will be able to at least match it in the October collection.

I will also do some further investigation into the types of support that the two congregations may need. As Rev. Valerie put it, "We do know about disaster and trauma." In the interim, I will be bringing (or anyone can bring) cards/notecards to Sunday service for the next couple of weeks so that we may show immediate solidarity with these two congregations.

On a happier note - We have been invited to share an end of day meal with the teenage participants of the Youth Empowerment Program (YEP) at Rural & Migrant Ministry's 2023 Summer Day Program (SDP) in Riverhead. We usually carpool, leaving the parsonage parking lot at about 4:15 with a quick stop to pick up the requested pizza for dinner.
